
Dear Parent(s)/Carer(s) of Robin Hall,

Welcome to Spring term 2 and the new and exciting learning journey called 'On the farm'.



'On the farm' is a wide-ranging topic with plenty of opportunity for the children to learn about caring for the environment, animals and for themselves. Looking at farms that grow crops and vegetables extends the scope of this topic and allows for lots of fun with planting, growing and cooking! We will be looking at different farm animals and how to look after them, natural materials and exploring where the food comes from. During this half-term we will also celebrate World Book Day (w/b 1st March) and look at Easter festival towards the end of the half-term.

Preparing your home learning environment

A farm is a piece of land used to grow crops and/or raise animals.

People who grow these plants or raise these animals are called **farmers**. This type of work is called **farming**.

Land that is used to grow plants for food, or could be used to grow plants for food is called arable land. A life raising animals for food is called a pastoral life.

Here are some ten farm animal facts you should know.

- 1. Animal babies have special names, e.g. Cow's baby is called a calf (we'll learn more about them soon)
- 2. Hens lay eggs which are then taken to the shops for sale.
- 3. Milk comes from cows. This called milking the cow.
- 4. Sheep need serious haircuts. This is called shearing the sheep.
- 5. All the farm animals have special places to live on the farm., e.g. horses live in a stable (we'll learn more about them soon)
- 6. Anyone can work a farm.
- 7. Farmers grow food such as vegetables and fruits and these are sent to shops for sale.
- 8. Farmers use equipment on the farm such as tractors and ploughs.
- 9. Some animals help on the farm such sheep dogs and horses.
- 10. Farms can vary in size with some being bigger that your school and some being very small.


Can you name all the farm animals in the pictures? Which animal is your favourite one and why?

Design and Make a farm





"Hello everyone, our activity this week is to make a farm. I wonder what we can use to make it? What do you think?"

Watch Mrs Idziaszczyk's video <u>here</u> and join in creative activity of building a little farm. **Remember to look into your learning pack to find some useful pictures and materials.**

Mrs Idziaszczyk decided to use: an empty paper box, paint, crayons, felt pens, some tissue paper, glue and cut out animals that all of you have in your nursery packs.

We hope to see your farm creations on Tapestry.

Outdoor Activity: 'Move like an animal' game

To play this game you need an adult to say different things you would find on a farm and the children need to move in different ways.

Duck – paddle hands and move slowly around the space.

Chicken –flap arms like wings and scratch the floor with feet.

Lamb – jump and skip around the space.

Horse – gallop around the space.

Scarecrow – stand up straight and still with legs together and arms stretched out to the sides.

Tractor – move slowly around the space in straight lines moving arms like wheels.

When children are used to the action for each animal/object the adult can change their instructions more quickly. The children can then try and remember which movement they need to do.



The Nursery rhyme of this week is: Old MacDonald had a farm



Please spend some time each day and learn the words of the song. Sing it together and act out different animal walk and noises.



Creative collage

In your learning pack, you have a little sandwich bag with some creative bits (*crepe paper, lolly stick, feather, 3 animals, etc.*) for you to make a collage picture. All you need is glue and some colouring pencils or pens.

You don't need scissors as you can tear paper with your fingers.

Use your imagination and think where you are going to put the animals that you have in your creative bag. Here is where Mrs Powrie put them: my pig is in the mud; my duck is in the pond and my cow is eating some grass near the farm house. It is a sunny day on my farm and I tried to draw a tractor too. I also drew an extra duck and it is next to the pond with a feather that I found in my creative sandwich bag. **Have fun and send us your collage pictures and send us your photos on Tapestry.**


